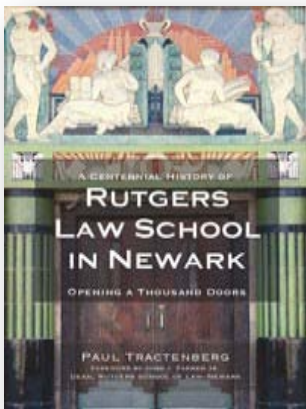
Clement Price, Faculty of Arts & Sciences, was honored with Essex County's Martin Luther King, Jr. Leadership Award in February 2010.
